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Landmark 1:

Mount Rushmore, South Dakota

Mount Rushmore spans roughly 1,300 acres. It shows the faces of four famous American presidents: George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Theodore Roosevelt, and Abraham Lincoln.



Travel Trivia:

When Mount Rushmore was originally completed in 1941, the construction cost was roughly \$1 million! With inflation, what would this cost amount to in today's dollars?

- A) \$13-18 million
- B) \$500 million
- C) \$13-18 billion

Landmark 2:

The Golden Gate Bridge, California

The Golden Gate Bridge opened in 1937. Acting as a land connection between San Francisco and Marin County, CA, it is the longest suspension bridge in the world, measuring 4,200 feet long. That is almost 12 football fields!



Travel Trivia:

If you are driving across the Golden Gate Bridge into San Francisco, you must pay a toll. Toll amounts change depending on the size of the vehicle. How much is the toll for a small motorcycle?

Landmark 3:

The Statue of Liberty, New York

The Statue of Liberty was gifted to the United States by France in 1884. The statue is made of copper. Originally, the copper looked reddish-brown, but as it weathered overtime, it slowly became the green that we see today.



Travel Trivia:

The French paid for the statue's construction, which totaled roughly \$250,000! The United States built the statue's pedestal in the 1880s for structural support. How much did the pedestal cost when it was created?

Landmark 4:

The White House, Washington D.C.

The White House has served as the home of 46 American presidents (all except George Washington). It has 132 rooms, 35 bathrooms, and 412 doors... Sounds like the perfect place to play hide-and-seek!

A lot of the White House's furniture is historic and, in turn, expensive! The most expensive piece of furniture is known to be the Resolution Desk, which sits in the President's Oval Office. While the original desk has not been sold, a replica from the National Archives Store would cost roughly _____!

Landmark 5:

Yellowstone National Park, Wyoming

Yellowstone National Park is the first national park in the United States. While housing a variety of plants and wildlife, the park is home to half of the world's geysers. The most famous geyser, Old Faithful, erupts about every 90 minutes.

To enter Yellowstone, visitors must buy a vehicle pass that lasts seven days. How much does this pass cost?

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Landmark 6:

The Space Needle, Washington

The Space Needle is a 605-foot-tall observation tower in Seattle. Though high in the sky, it was engineered to withstand wind gusts of up to 200 mph!

Landmark 7:

The Grand Canyon, Arizona

The Grand Canyon is home to 91 mammal species and 5 different habitats. It is the second most-visited national park, attracting millions every year.

Landmark 8:

The Gateway Arch, Missouri

The Gateway Arch, a 630-foot monument, was created in 1965. It was built to honor westward expansion and Thomas Jefferson's 1803 Louisiana Purchase, which doubled the size of the United States at the time of acquisition!



Travel Trivia:

The Louisiana Purchase was about 828,000 square miles of land. France sold it to the United States for close to \$18 per square mile, equaling a total cost of roughly how much money?

Landmark 9:

Walt Disney World, Florida

Walt Disney World opened in 1971 and has expanded into four major theme parks that draw roughly 10,000 visitors each day.



Travel Trivia:

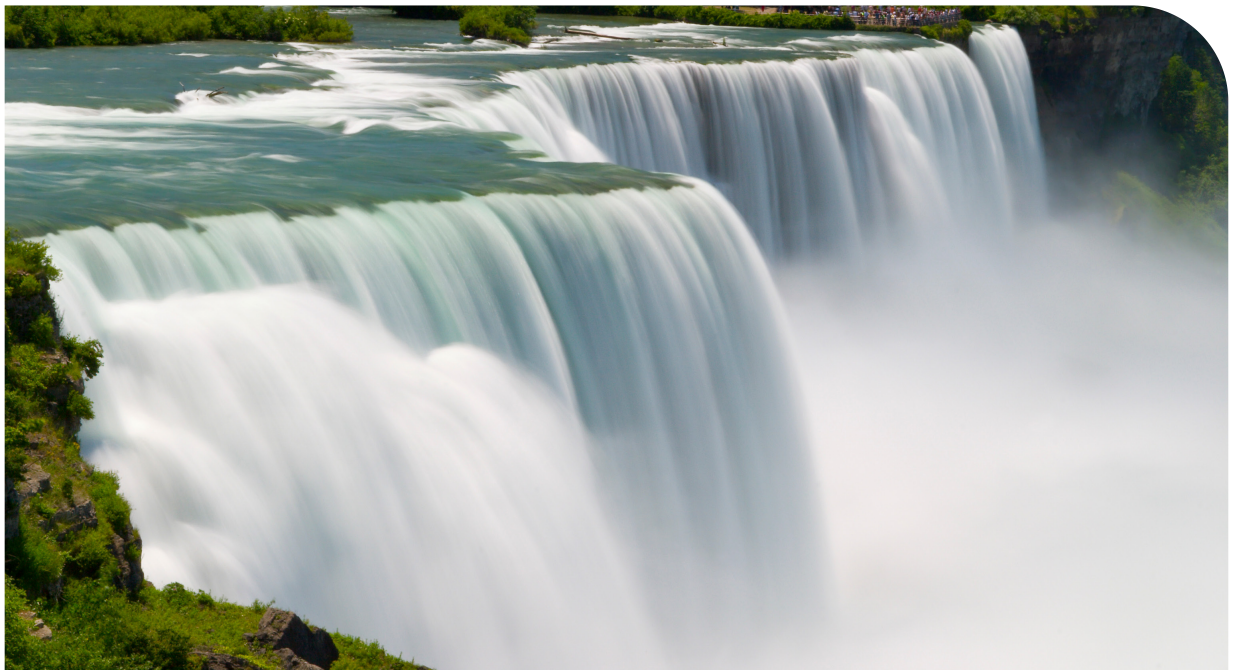
Over 55 years, Disney's admission prices have increased substantially. How much did it cost to enter Disney World when it first opened?

Landmark 9:

Niagara Falls, New York

The Maid of the Mist, Niagara Fall's historic boat ride, takes tourists as close as possible to the base of the waterfall. About how much money does it cost for an adult to ride this boat?
